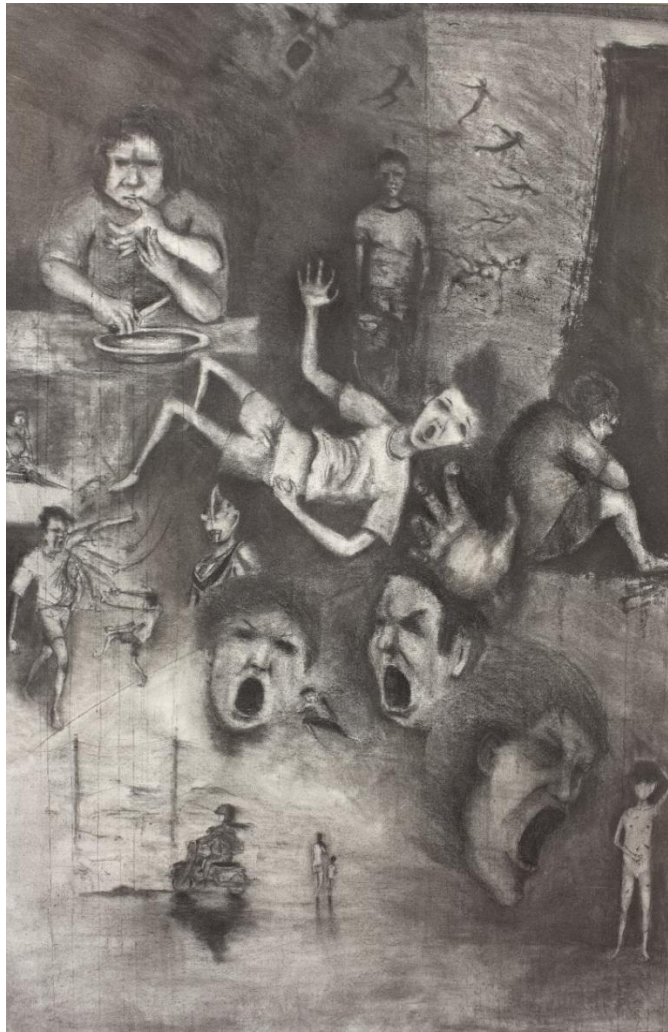

Artist Statement

I am into drawing humans since I was young and my interest is in drawing and painting using charcoal and oil paint. I tend to observe myself and the people around me - their behaviors, movements, and physical actions. A series of works I produced embarked on my childhood memories, it moved on to observe human nature and their responses to circumstances in our society. I prefer to paint randomly to allow chances to emerge on my canvases instead of working according to pre-planned composition rigidly. I use charcoal to draw on both primed and unprimed canvas. Oil paint, acrylic, charcoal, and pigment pen are my favorite tools in my works. I use charcoal and ink to create shadows and lines on canvas to present a different effect to bring out the tension that I want from the work.

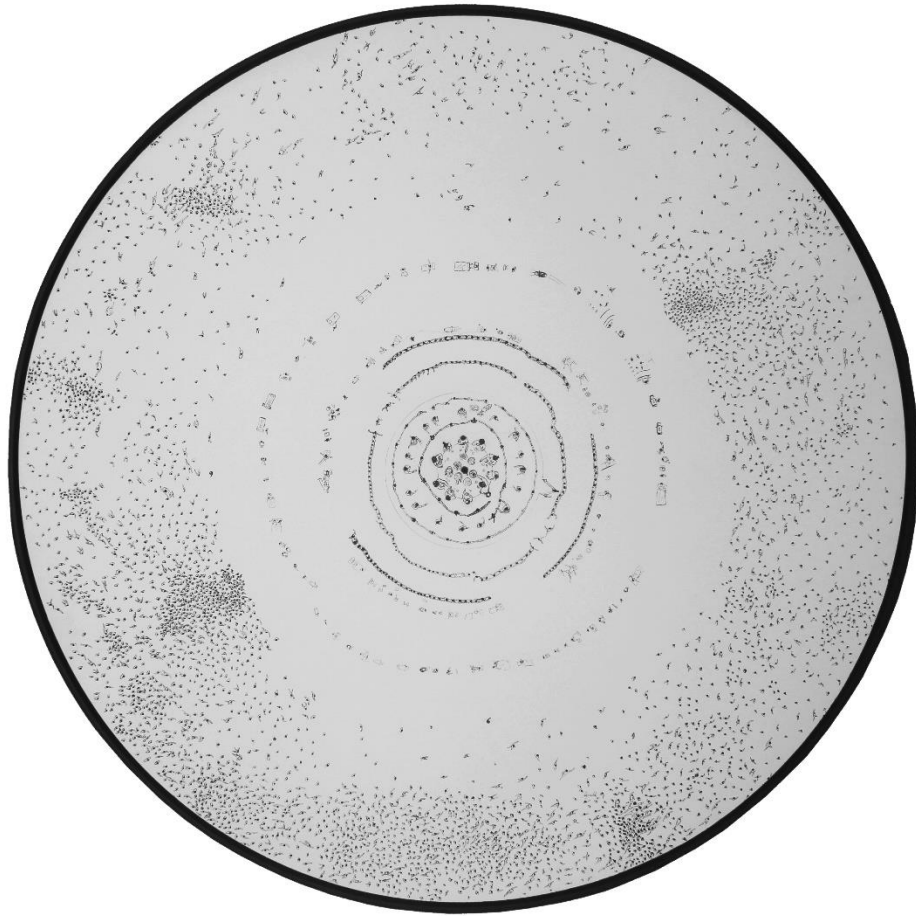

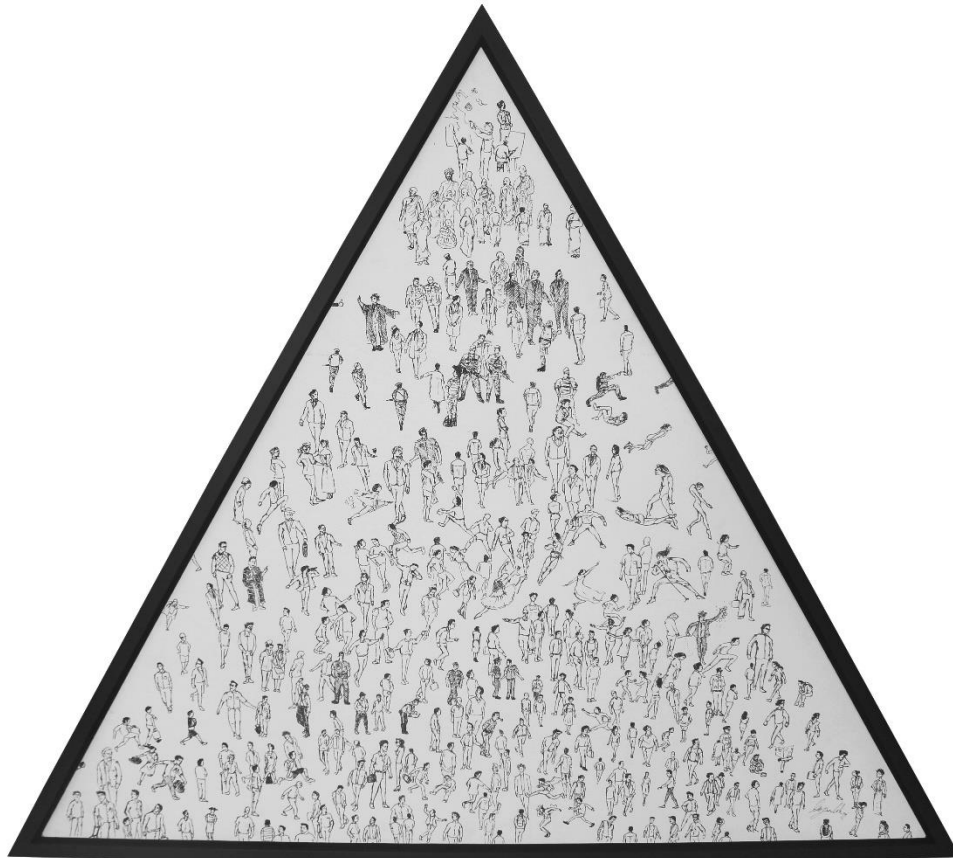

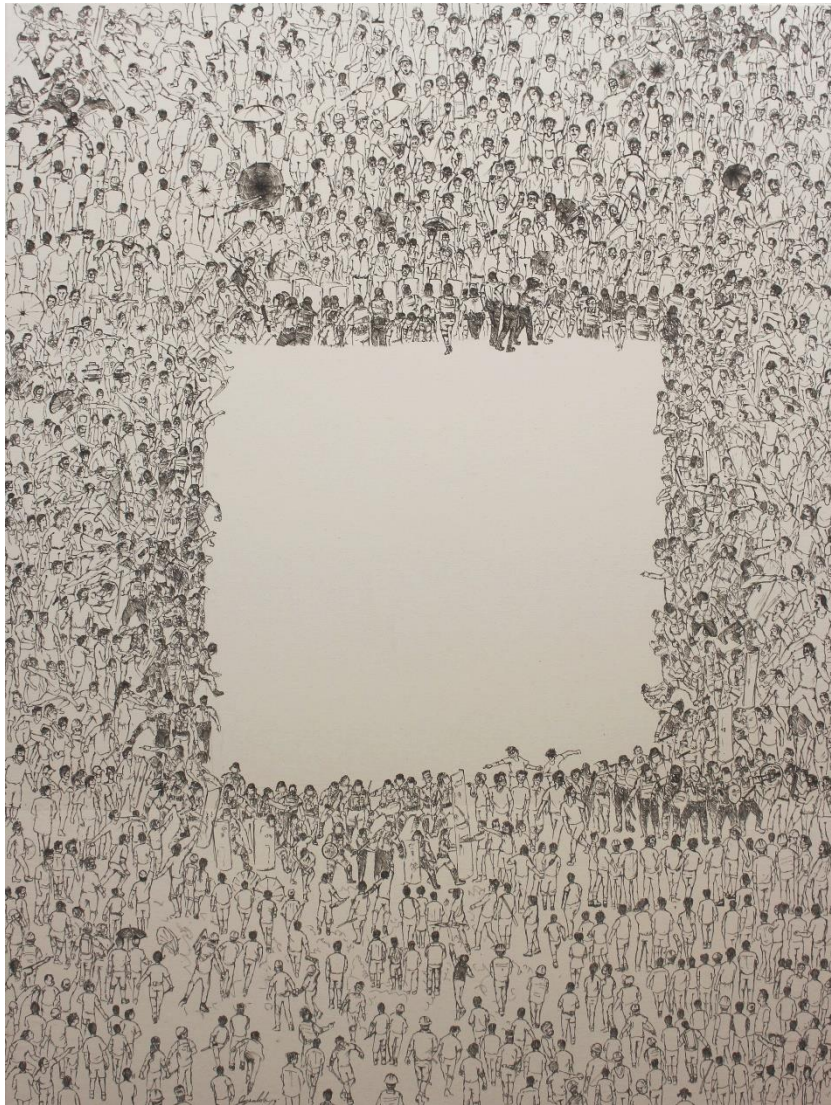

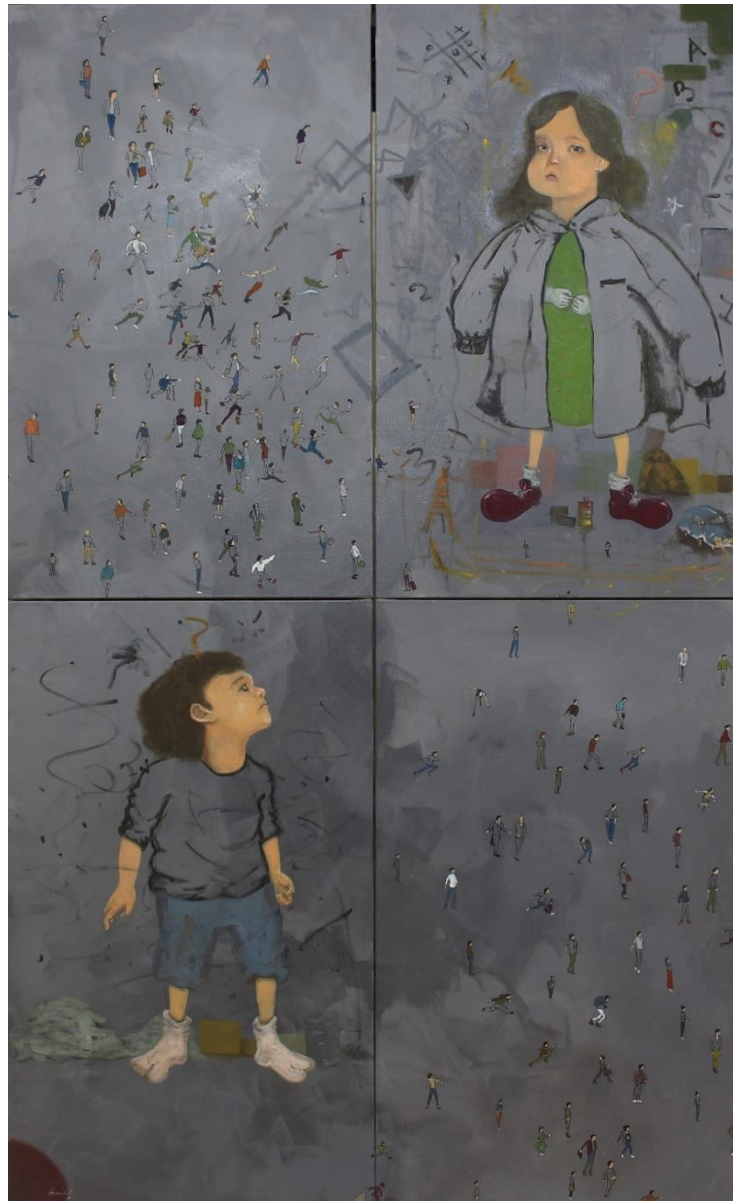

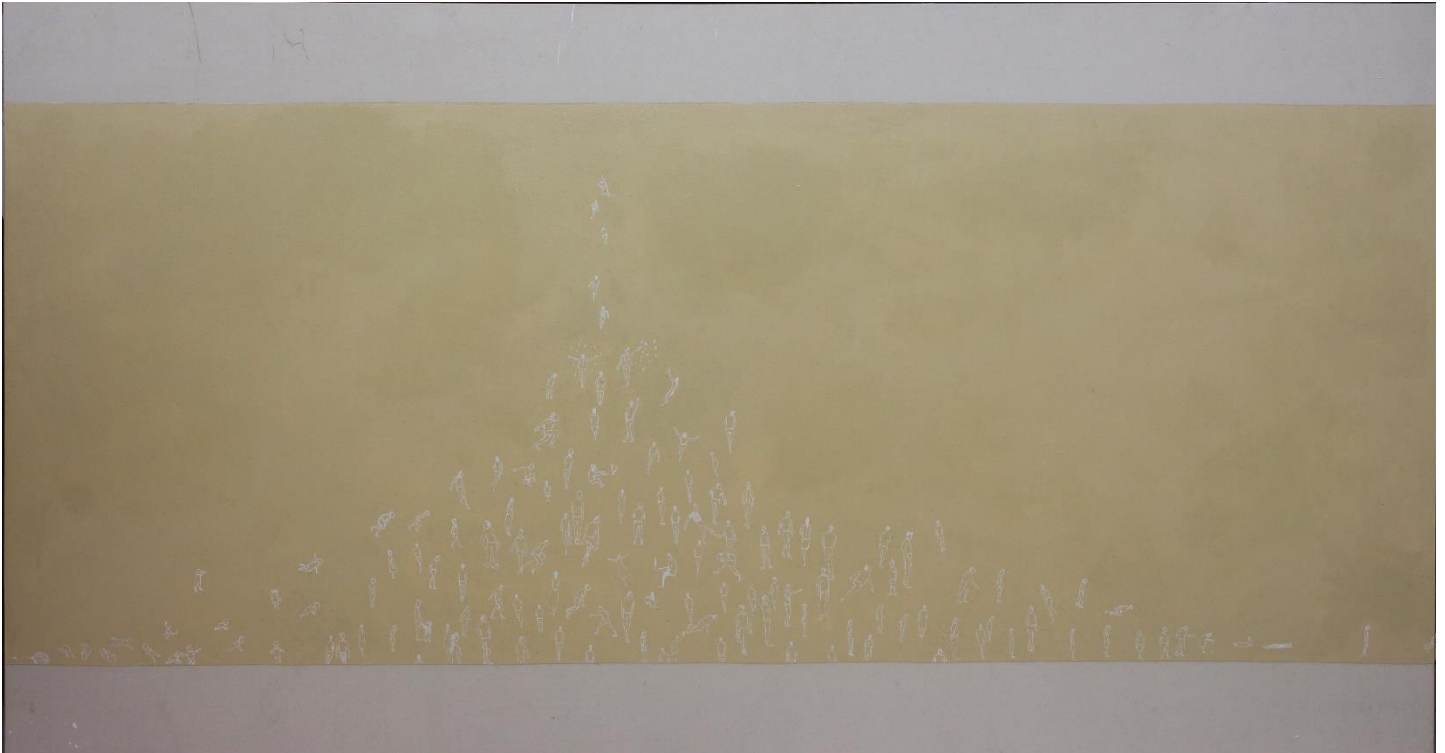

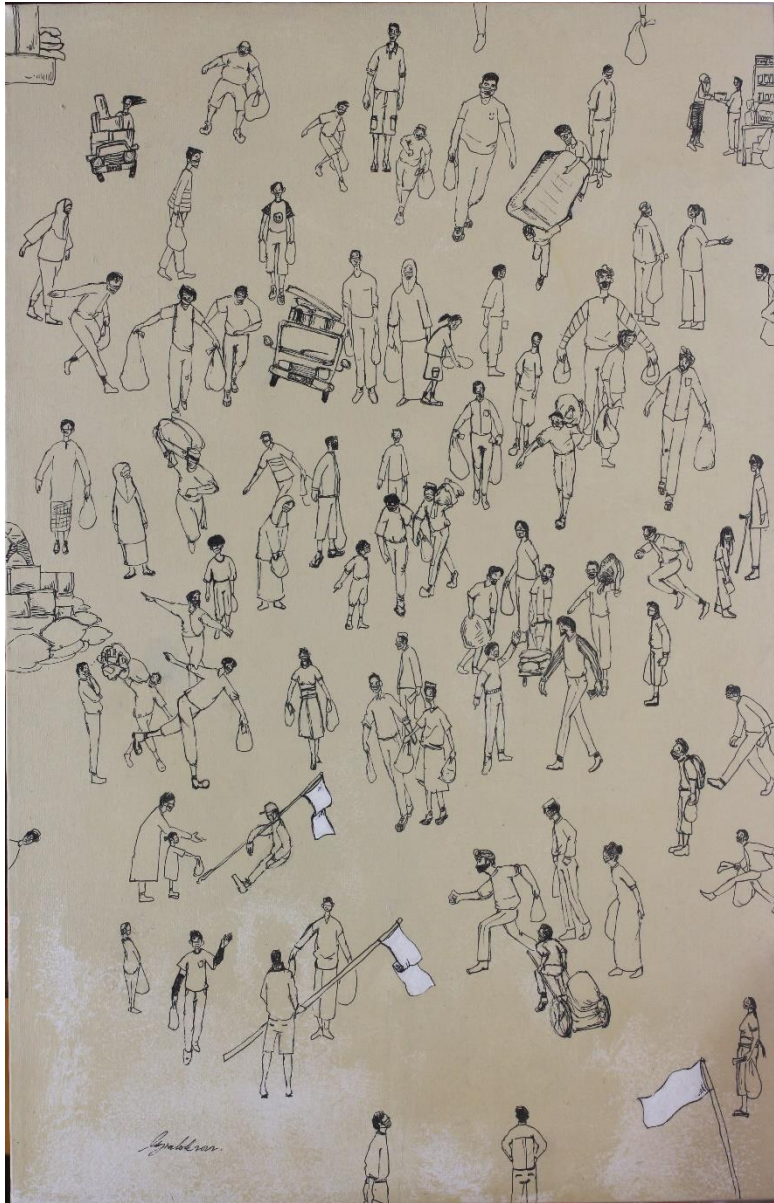

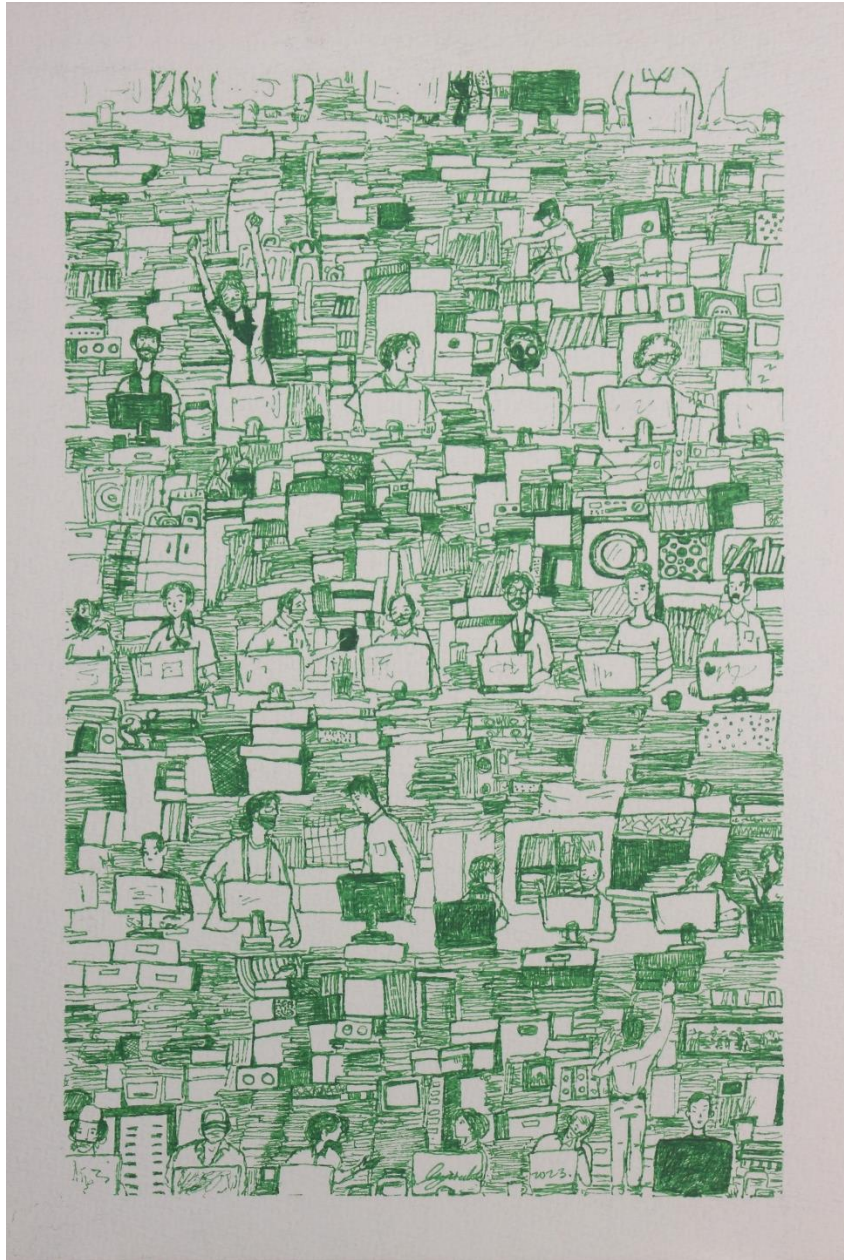

The child's understanding and inclusive outlook inspired me to create these pieces. In the artwork, you can notice that all humans remain uncoloured, represented in white. This symbolizes my intention not to classify them based on their race as Malaysians. Instead, I painted different skin colours on the background, representing the diverse races present in our country. I want to emphasize that while these races are part of our unique Malaysian culture, they should not be the basis for classification. Our diversity should be celebrated, not used to separate us.
